

# RPA HOSPITAL REDEVELOPMENT

**PROJECT UPDATE NOVEMBER 2022** 

## Project overview

The NSW Government has committed \$750 million to the redevelopment of Royal Prince Alfred (RPA) Hospital to deliver a new hospital building and refurbishment of existing spaces.

This is the most significant investment in RPA's 140-year history to support the world-leading services provided at RPA for the 740,000 people who live in Sydney Local Health District and the more than 1 million people who come into the District each day to work, study and visit. The project will be delivered by Health Infrastructure in partnership with Sydney Local Health District.

When complete, the RPA Redevelopment will deliver:

- Expanded and enhanced Emergency Department and Intensive Care Units
- State-of-the-art operating theatres
- Expanded and improved adult inpatient accommodation
- Increased interventional and imaging services
- Expanded women's neonatology services
- Facilities and capabilities for integrated research, education and training
- Additional adult inpatient beds
- Improved public spaces and services including roads, wayfinding, landscaping and information and communications technology infrastructure.



## **Enabling works**

Early enabling works are site preparation works that generally take place before the main construction contract.

#### **Timing of work**

Enabling works will take place in stages and will commence in November 2022. The first stage will take up to ten months to complete. Standard work hours are 7:00am to 5:00pm Monday to Friday and 8:00am to 1:00pm Saturdays. Out of hours work will be needed to avoid impacting community and stakeholders.

## **Enabling Works Contractor**

Indigenous construction company Barpa were the successful candidates in the contract tender for enabling works. A majority Indigenous owned company, Barpa prides themselves on respectful Indigenous engagement and strives to make a positive difference for Australia's First Peoples. Barpa has extensive experience in delivering complex infrastructure within the health sector.



#### What do the enabling works include?

From November 2022, the first stage of enabling works will include the following.

Works related to traffic and vehicle access:

- Reconfigure Lambie Dew Drive turning bay
- Reconfigure Gloucester House Bridge
- Remove and reinstate pedestrian bridge on Level 4, between B89 and Gloucester House Repave forecourt area at Gloucester House
- · Build a turning bay opposite the loading dock
- Gloucester House road hump adjustment.


Works relating to vegetation:

- Remove existing trees on Lambie Dew Drive
- Tree pruning on the corner of Missenden Road and Gloucester House Drive.

Works relating to relocation of hospital services:

Anatomical Pathology (AP) relocated to Building 12

#### Where to next?

During the traffic work, there will be some restricted vehicle access to certain areas including the day surgery drop off lane. All restrictions will be well signposted, with active traffic management on site to support the safe flow of traffic.
